# ANT 305S: Social Media and the Contemporary Arab World Spring 2012: Mondays 6:45 – 9:15

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# **Course Description**

This course explores the spectacular changes that have occurred in Arab Nations as a result of the "Arab Spring." The course engages how and to what ends social media networks and new technology platforms are being used to transform political and cultural terrains in predominantly Muslim Arab countries throughout North Africa and the Middle East. During the term students will be given a comprehensive overview of cultures in North Africa and the Middle East and learn about existing and new social structures and technology tools impacting the contemporary Arab World.

# **Course Objectives**

- Solution Provide students with an anthropological understanding of North African and Middle Eastern Cultures.
- Senable students to elaborate on contemporary social issues and political transformations shaping the current cultural landscapes of the region.
- Solution Provide students with an understanding of the role of social media and new technologies in the emergence of a politicized public sphere and the developments of the "Arab Spring."

At the same time you will expand your understanding of cultures in North Africa and the Middle East and social media. In addition to writing assignments during the term you will be required to hand in a **Final Research Paper**.
